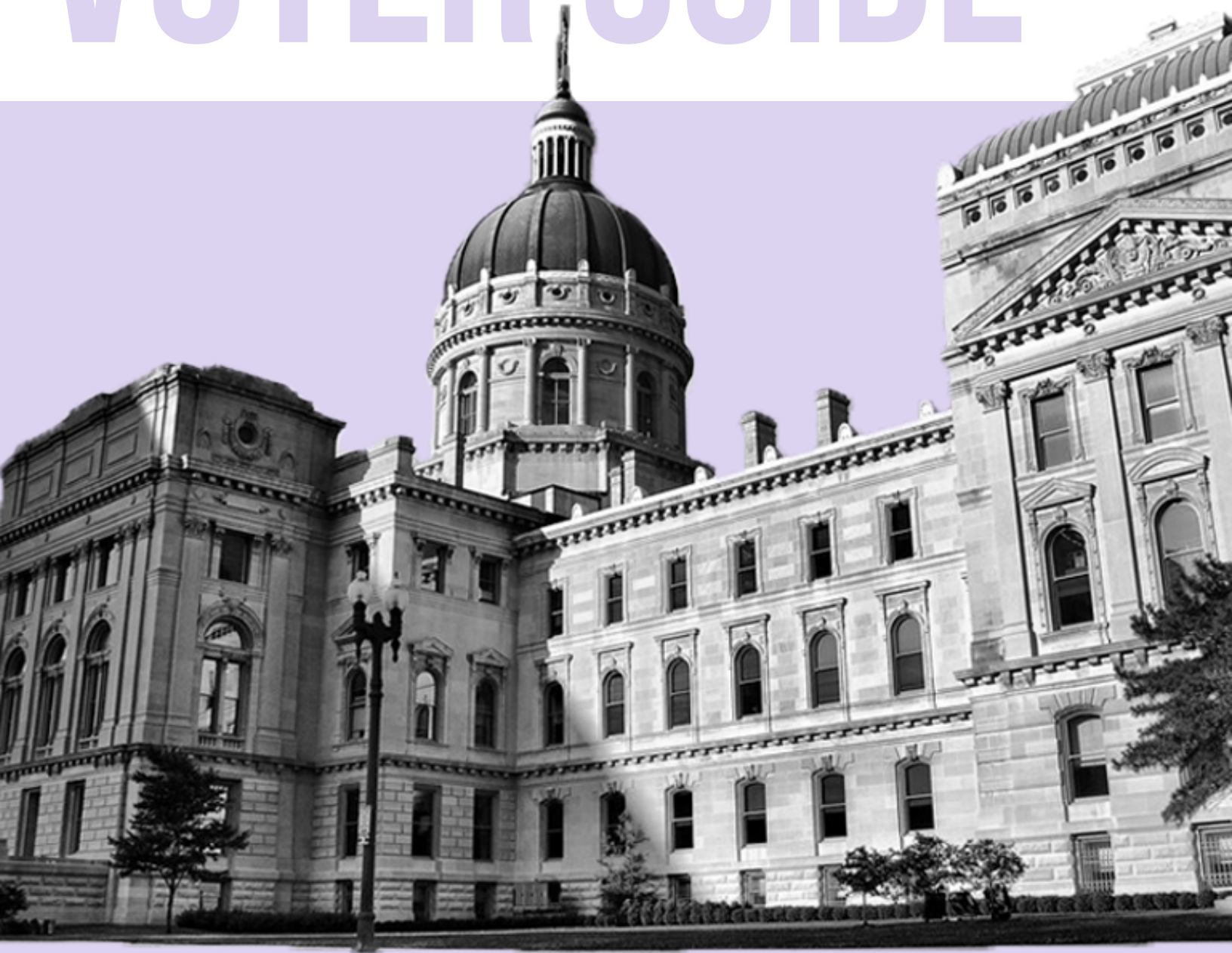

2024 VOTING CALENDAR

THE PRIMARY ELECTION

Monday, April 8 - Voter Registration Deadline (11:59pm)

Tuesday, April 9 - Early Voting Begins

Thursday, April 25 - Application to request a vote-by-mail ballot must be received by 11:59pm

Monday, May 6 - Early Voting Ends

Tuesday, May 7 - Primary Election Day

THE GENERAL ELECTION

Monday, October 7 - Voter Registration Deadline (11:59pm)

Tuesday, October 8 - Early Voting Begins

Thursday, October 24 - Application to request a vote-by-mail ballot must be received by 11:59pm

Monday, November 4 - Early Voting Ends

Tuesday, November 5 - General Election Day



WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE PRIMARY AND GENERAL ELECTION?

The purpose of a primary election is to narrow down the candidates for a given elective office or party to decide the final nominees for the next general election.



In a general election, final candidates from each party run against one another. The purpose of this election is to elect the winning candidates into office.



VOTING PLAN CHECKLIST



Check your voter registration

Where do I go to vote?



Enter the address where you are registered to vote to find the location(s) you may cast your ballot at.



WHAT TO BRING TO THE POLLS

In order to cast a ballot in Indiana, you must present a **government-issued photo ID** that meets these requirements:

- Includes the voter's name
- Includes a photograph of the voter
- Includes an expiration date that shows the ID current or expired after the last general election

Without a valid ID, voters may still cast a provisional ballot. For their vote to be counted, they must present a valid ID to the election board by noon on the 10th day after the election.

ON YOUR BALLOT

Indiana voters will elect individuals to serve in the following offices:

- Presidential electors and alternate electors pledged to support candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States
- US Senator (1 Seat)
- Governor and Lieutenant Governor
- Attorney General
- United States House of Representatives (all 9 seats)
- Indiana State Senate (25 of 50 seats)
- Indiana House of Representatives (all 100 seats)
- Judges of Circuit and Superior Court in several counties
- Clerks of the Circuit Court, County Auditors, County Recorders, County Treasurers, County Coroners, County Surveyors, County Assessors, County Commissioners and County Council Members in several counties
- Township Board members in Marion County
- School Board members, elected by voters in several school corporations
- Town Council members, Town Clerk-Treasurers and Town Judges in certain towns, which have chosen to elect some or all town offices during 2024
- The retention of justices of the Indiana Supreme Court, judges of the Indiana Court of Appeals, and local judges in several counties
- Voters will vote on any local public question placed on the ballot in accordance with state law
- Democratic and Republican Party state convention delegates elected at the primary election
- Republican Party precinct committeemen elected at the primary election
NOTE: Democratic Party Precinct Committeemen are elected in 2026.

Women4Change Indiana notes: The term Precinct Committeemen is the official term used on all Indiana State elections precinct committee chair filing documents.
